Is Volunteering In Your Future? By Barry Beach

Do one or more of the following apply to you?

- Thinking of buying a horse and/or vehicle to show but are unfamiliar with what is required or appropriate.
- Not sure what kind or level of showing (English, Western, eventing, driving, etc.) would interest you.
- Enjoy horse events but owning a horse is not possible or realistic at this stage of life for you given your resources.
- Enjoy watching horse events but are tired of sitting while all kinds of interesting activities are going on around you at the show.
- Enjoy traveling but would like to include horse events in your trip which would provide you with "hands on" activities at the show.
- Retired and would like to spend time at horse events without all the costs that owning and showing incur.
- Tired of showing but still enjoy being involved at horse shows and meeting new people with similar horse interests.

If any or all of the above apply to you, perhaps volunteering at a horse show is the answer! All horse shows, regardless of the type, could not possibly occur without volunteers. You can volunteer at small local one-day shows, or at larger shows lasting up to a week. No special skills are required except commitment to whatever it is you have volunteered to do.

Volunteering at horse shows will give you the best view of the show, introduce you to many people who share the same horse interest as you, and help you to decide if that type of horse activity is what you really want to invest time and money in. Volunteering helps expand your knowledge of the horse world and also enables you to become active in horse events without even owning a horse.

Consider local club shows or local fairs. In the driving world, Internet sites such as Drive Ontario and the American Driving Society list many driving shows and events, including local, provincial and North American. All shows need volunteers. It can be a very rewarding experience, a great way to meet new people, and a very practical way to gain knowledge in a different kind of showing that you may not be familiar with.

Interested In CDEs? Why Not Try A One-Day Driving Trial By Lynda Rivington

Have you ever thought about competing in a combined driving event (CDE)? If so, starting out at a one-day driving trial is an excellent introduction to what to expect in a CDE.

Last spring, several EOPDS members travelled to Relhok Farm in Barrie for an Introduction to Combined Driving Clinic put on by the Ontario Combined Driving Association (OCDA). Then, in July, four of us ventured to Limehouse for an OCDA-sponsored one-day driving trial at Bill MacGillivray's Glencameron Farm.

We had always wanted to try this kind of event but never had the opportunity. This was an adventure and we knew beforehand that we had a lot to learn and remember.

Mary Mulligan and I were in the training division – myself with a single pony and **Mary** in the single horse division – and **Ian Mulligan** and **Maney McNeil** were our navigators. On site, we encountered junior club member **Shelby Heinbuch**, who was a working student at Relhok for the summer and was navigating for the seasoned competitor, **Jeffrey Kohler**, at this event.

The morning schedule consisted of our dressage tests and cones courses. With these two phases behind us, ahead in the afternoon was the marathon, which none of us had encountered before – and what a learning experience it was! So much to remember! Everything from flags to stop watches, maps, gates, green cards, negotiating obstacles correctly, trying to check time at strategic places, to remembering the course – it was all a challenge but great fun! The importance of a navigator quickly became apparent. And then there was the all-important vet check at the end of the marathon.

We had a grand time and learned a lot. It was certainly worth the drive from Ottawa for the experience. So, this year, if you think you might be interested in this aspect of driving, why not consider a driving trial. It is very educational, and a fun and low-key introduction to this sport. Afterwards, when you receive your test sheets and scores, you can review the day and see where you can improve for the next time.
